Grain Merchant,

That nothing succeeds like success is freely demonstrated by the volume of business transacted annually by Mr. C. Goode, who might very properly be styled the grain king of this northern country. For thirty-five years he has been in the grain business and now owns and operates elevators at fifteen, points, viz : Bradford, Locust Hill, Claremont, Myrtle, Burketon, Nestleton, Pontypool, Cavanville, Mono. Road, Chatsworth, Millbrook, Milton, Hawkestone, Oro Ash. Said elevators have a capacity of 600,000 bushels and most of them are being operated by steam or gaso-line power. Mr. Goode, who handles from 700,000 to 1,000,000 bushels of grain annually, purchased the elevators here in 1903 from Mr. Wm. Wright, who for many years represented the Patrons of Industry of this neighborhood, and who erected a Grist mill which was afterwards destroyed by fire. Mr. Goode was born in the township of North Gwillimbury, and did business in Gilford and at several other points on the Northern Railway, now the G. T. R., and had personal dealings with many farmers in the districts extending from Aurora and Newmarket to Cookstown and Alliston, and North Gwillimbury and Georgina. For sevcral years Mr. Goode was in the general store and grain business at Chatsworth, and in 1884 he opened his present business in Toronto. He feels very grateful to his many friends and customers in Bradford and all other points for their confidence and support during so many years.
