

MARSH GROWER INSTANTLY KILLED WHEN STRUCK BY CAR ON SATURDAY NIGHT

**John Paulov Killed When Struck
By Southbound Motor About
8 O'Clock Saturday Night**

John Paulov, 45, Bradford, was instantly killed on Saturday night November 8th, at about 8 p.m., on Highway No. 11, just south of the turn in the road at the eastern end of the town. Paulov, who was a marsh-land owner, residing on one of the properties facing on the highway, had just come out of his home, which is the second south of the town, to visit a friend living on toward the bridge. In order to walk on the highway facing the traffic, he had to cross the road. It is believed that he was proceeding across the highway when a car driven by Lewis I. Noble, 33, Lavina Ave., Toronto, a son of R. Noble, West Gwillimbury, travelling south pulled out to pass another car. Paulov was caught by the left front fender and his head struck the door of the car heavily. Death is believed to have been instantaneous.

An inquest is to be held on Friday, November 21st, at 7.30 p.m., in the Town Hall, Bradford, at which Dr. R. H. Judge, Coroner, will preside.

Noble was not held following the accident and no charge was laid.

This particular strip of road appears to be a dangerous spot. During the past two years four persons have been killed within 100 to 200 feet of the spot where Paulov met his death on Saturday night.

The accident was investigated by Provincial Constables Dean and Ferguson, and Constable Reeves.

Paulov was a married man and is survived by his widow and three children.

Paulov was a native of Czechoslovakia, coming to Canada in 1924. He was a naturalized British subject. His wife came to this country in 1928 and their three children, aged 5, 7, and 8 years are Canadian born. They came to the Holland Marsh from Toronto only last spring and but two weeks ago invested their season's profits in marsh land, intending to make this their home in future. The widow and children are returning to Toronto for the winter but hope to return in the spring to crop their land.

The funeral was held from T. Kilkenny & Son Funeral Home yesterday afternoon, with interment in Mount Pleasant Cemetery. Services were conducted by the minister of The Church of All Nations, Toronto.
