

# Dr. L. H. Campbell Passes From Stroke

Entire Life Spent in Bradford  
Where He Practiced Over  
Two Score Years

Dr. Lewis H. Campbell, practicing physician in Bradford for over two score years, passed away at his home last Sunday night. Dr. Campbell's health had caused much concern among his friends for some time but his indomitable spirit, love for his profession, and keen interest in the welfare of his patients kept him on duty and it was only during the past few weeks that he definitely decided to retire from active practice. Last Thursday night while walking along the hall of his home he was stricken with a stroke, and, though he lingered for a few days, almost from the first it was realized that he could not recover.

Born in Bradford, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Campbell, Dr. Campbell had spent his entire life in this village, being educated in Bradford schools and Toronto University. Among the doctors who graduated with him, two members of the class came to advise for him in his last illness, Dr. Herbert Bruce, Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario, and Dr. Frank Forrest of Port Hope.

One of Canada's finest athletes of his age, Bradford was proud of Dr. Lewis Campbell. He was one the most versatile of athletes, being captain of Varsity football team, excelling in a game of cricket while as a lacrosse player he toured the world, one of the stars of an all-star Canadian team. After ceasing to take an active part in athletics he became an enthusiastic supporter and to the last one of his keenest pleasures was to be an onlooker at a field meet or game of sport.

Immediately after graduating Dr. Campbell began his medical practice in Bradford and in his chosen profession, as in the world of sport, he gave unstinted energy, never sparing himself, and winning a most enviable reputation for skillful diagnosis and treatment, yet his kindness and sympathy for the sick and distressed made him beloved by many as a typical country doctor.

In 1900 he married Miss Louise Graham of Toronto, a lady who was a noble partner and assisted him much in a successful career. She predeceased him five years ago. In June, 1932, he married Miss Margrit Bike, daughter of the late E. Bike, consul of the German Government, and the late Mrs. Bike, and niece of the Baroness Von Beden; now residing in Berlin, Germany.

Dr. Campbell had served on the Board of Education and until the time of his death was Medical Health Officer for Bradford. An ardent Liberal in politics, he was president of the local association. He was also a life member of Simcoe Lodge A. F. & A. M.

Surviving are his widow, one brother, Mr. Wm. L. Campbell, and one sister, Miss E. Campbell, all of Bradford, to whom sympathy in their sorrow is extended.

The funeral, which is private, takes place today from his late residence with Rev. C. H. Forth, pastor of the United Church, of which deceased was a member, conducting the services. Interment will be made in Mount Pleasant cemetery, Bradford.
