and fish, and kept journals

of life in the Colony.

Elizabeth is the central, life-sized figure in this stone and bronze sculpture; there will be two bas reliefs, one on either side. Under her right arm are her sketch

son Francis. Among the

Our statue, made of rock and bronze, will cost \$75,000 plus landscaping costs. bronze plaque beside the statue. Tax receipts will also be issued.


