called an experience of our own when some five or six years after purchasing summer property and paying taxes, without notice of arrears on a tax bill, we received notice that our property would be sold for taxes if an amount of less than \$5 was not paid within a certain number of days. It was the same trick, with the previous owner, who told us he had some argument with the tax collector and he believed that he had won. We, of course, rushed to pay the trifling arrears, and when the previous owner heard about it he repaid us, but it would appear that this may not be so uncommon as the Legislature might believe. Our property would not have the same collector, but was in the general area in which the property dealt with last week was located. . . . A \$250,000 dam is being built at the Earl Rowe park on the Boyne river at Alliston, forming an 85-acre lake, which will be about the same size as the mill pond which was at the site fifty vears ago. The dam will incorporate a two-lane roadway and a pedestrian walk, with protective railings. . . . This is the rake-up and clean-up time for the majority of properties and it would seem timely to remind that grass fires can spread at terrific speed and cause a great deal of damage. Respect for one's own and neighbourhood property should make all who do burning careful of where they start a fire and also ever watchful to guard the lighted fire while there is any sign of flame. . . . Heard a broadcaster tell a story this week of quite unusual business methods for 1964. He said that four weeks ago, during a visit to the market at Kitchener, he had paid a Mennonite for a rug to be made, receiving neither a receipt nor the man's name. He returned to the market last Saturday, found the man and was given his rug. The bargain was that he was to get the rug on that day. That system of doing business would not be recommended with everyone. . , . "If you have
